Music has always filled my life with great joy. As a member of Mu Phi Epsilon, in addition to being inspired to become a better musician, I have, also, been inspired to improve my character by following the examples that have been set by our members--positive role models who promote the ideals of our fraternity.

During my 43 years of membership, one of the ideals of Mu Phi that has made a difference in my life is **FRIENDSHIP**. Since 1976, when I joined the newly-formed Gamma Sigma Chapter of Mu Phi at CSU, Dominguez Hills, and during my years of membership in the Palos Verdes/South Bay Alumni Chapter, I have had the opportunity to experience wonderful friendships with talented musicians who are generous and kind and are devoted to enriching the lives of others with their music, hard work, and excellent organizational skills.

I will never forget all of the help that I received from the Music Department faculty and the Palos Verdes Alumni Chapter while I was a music student at Dominguez Hills when we formed Gamma Sigma in 1976. I was the founding president, and yet, I knew absolutely nothing about the skills required to lead a collegiate organization, conduct a ritual, or organize a concert! I was amazed by the hard work and the kindness that were shown to me by the P. V. Alumni and Dominguez

faculty members, both women AND men. (Men were not allowed to join Mu Phi until the following year.)

In August 1977, I had the pleasure of representing Gamma Sigma at the 7th International Convention of Mu Phi Epsilon in Kansas City, Missouri, where I had the opportunity to meet musicians from all over the world! Our collegiate chapter was honored with two awards--quite a distinction for a chapter that was only a year old!! This recognition would not have been possible without all of the support from Dominguez faculty members and the P. V. Alumni Chapter!!

I will always be grateful for the **FRIENDSHIP** of the members of Mu Phi Epsilon. Enjoy your Founders' Day, 2019! Congratulations on another successful year!
